Richard Manfred Guttmacher died at the age of 85 at his home in Waterville, Maine on January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2018. A Baltimore native, he embraced both an intellectual and an outdoor life as he and his family moved northward from the Washington DC area, to the Boston suburbs, and then to Maine. He was married in 1953 to the late Ann Eskridge Guttmacher. His work included co-founding and directing the Bionetics Research Laboratories in Bethesda, Maryland, acting as the executive officer of MIT's seminal Educational Research Center, administrating and teaching in the earliest days of the celebrated Maine-Dartmouth Family Medicine Residency, and board chairmanship of the Oak Grove-Coburn School. He was an avid woodsman, fisherman, woodworker, reader of history and canine cohabiter, with a deep connection to the Rangeley Lakes Region, which he began visiting as a young boy, and where he proudly served for many years on the Ski Patrol at Saddleback Mountain. He is survived by his longtime companion, Lucia Whittelsey (of Waterville, Maine), his son, Peter (of Cheverly, Maryland) with his wife Robin Brownstein, his son Tom (of Providence, Rhode Island) with his wife Carol Cancro and their daughter Anna, and his brothers Jon (of Dorchester, Massachusetts), Lawrence (or Rochester, New York), and Alan (of Thetford, Vermont) who will all miss him tremendously.
